Service note: Tonight's liturgical dance presented during the anthem, *The Dance of Falling Asleep*, represents the disciples who cannot stay awake when asked by Jesus at Gethsemane. The dance is an excerpt of a longer work choreographed for Kinetics Dance Theatre in Ellicott City, MD. Seven dancers collaborated in January- February of 2023 to explore themes of helplessness, abandonment, safety, belonging, and a renewal of hope in the presence of God.

Poetry and art created by our congregation can be viewed in the Martha Manahan room. Thanks to everyone who participated in this unique expression of our faith.

Some of the items are used in tonight's service:

Children's Sunday School: The tree represents the tree of life, trees in the Garden of Gethsemane, and the cross. The hand-print table cloth represents Jesus' gift to us of his life.

Middle School Sunday School Class: A burnt match stick cross representing Ash Wednesday, the beginning of our Lenten journey.

WUMC – UMYF *Jesus Cross* (Narthex): The large painting represents Jesus, having come to earth in human form, saving humanity by dying on the cross on Good Friday and resurrecting on Easter Sunday. Scripture assures us that He was present at Creation, He is the Word, and is present at all times. The painting also depicts that Jesus is known through different means, communion being one, and through our lives and the lives of those around us. God's love and saving grace is inclusive and accepting of all.
